Journalists Create Memories



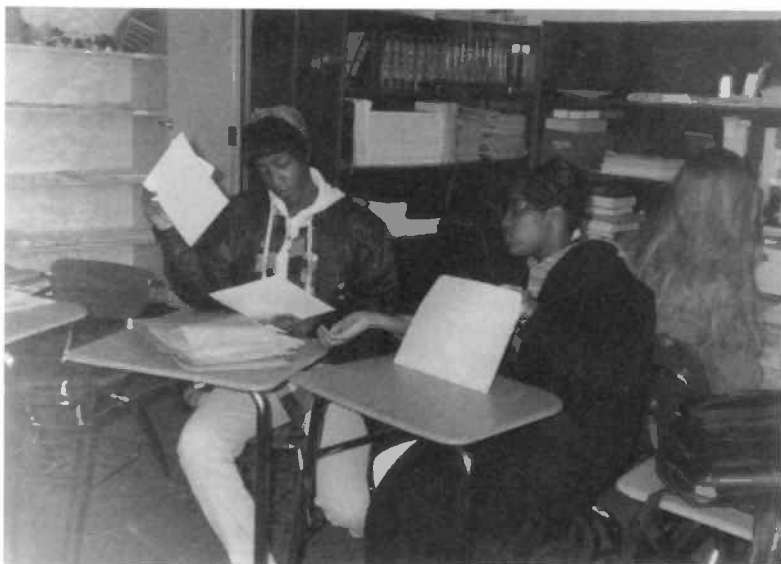
The Journalism class varied in numbers throughout the entire year but worked well together.

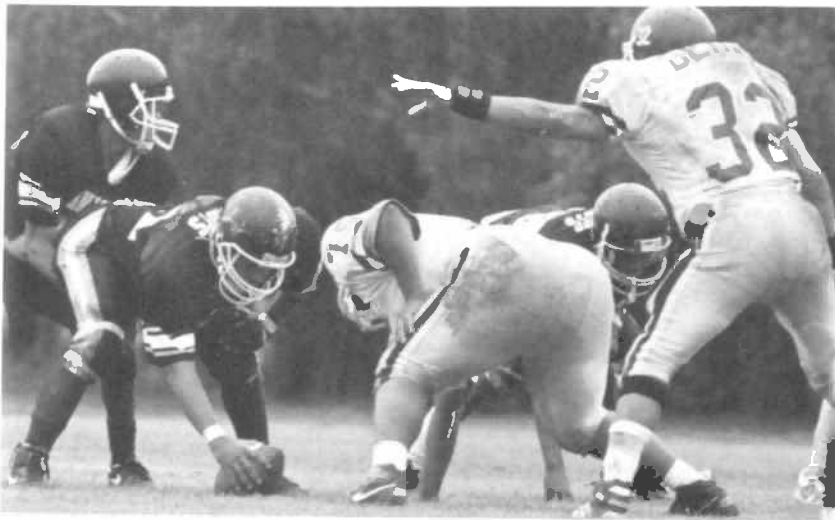
Next, in their visit to Augsburg, the Apaches dominated the Knights for most of the game for a 42-16 rout.

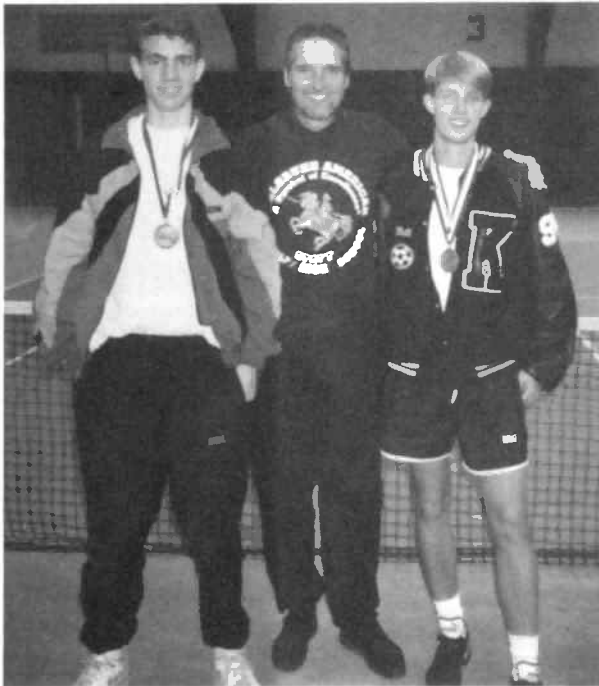


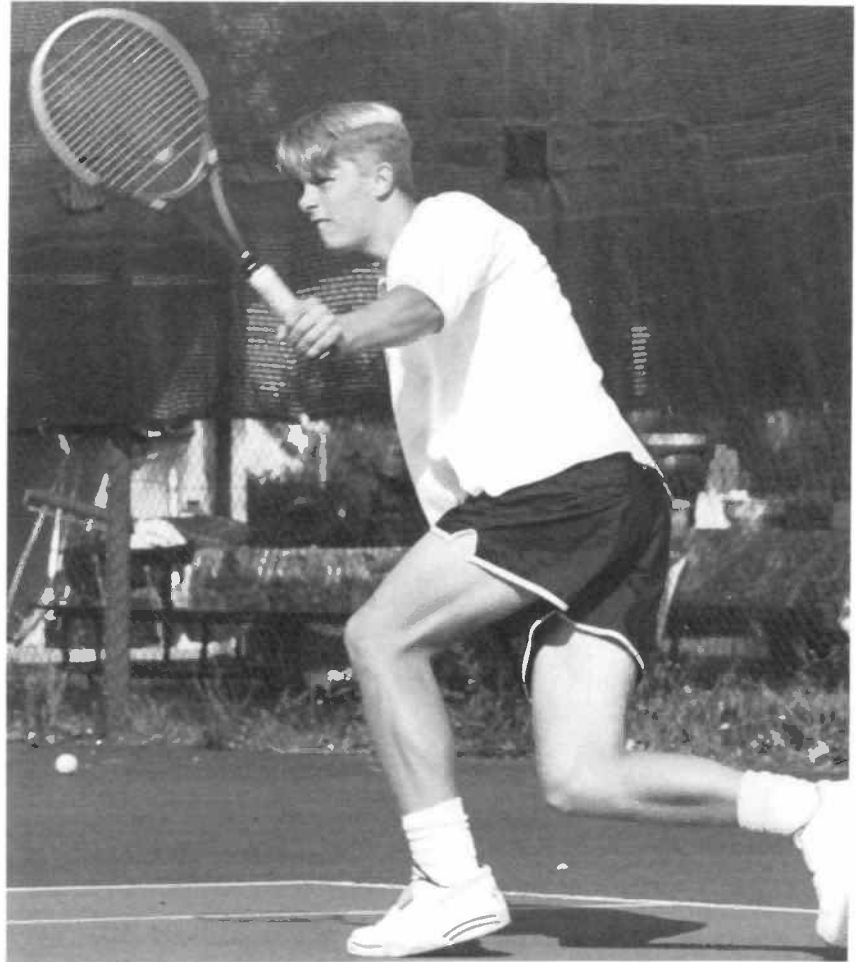

Unfortunately, the men's team was defeated, but the women's team came out triumphant and went through the season undefeated making them Division III champions.

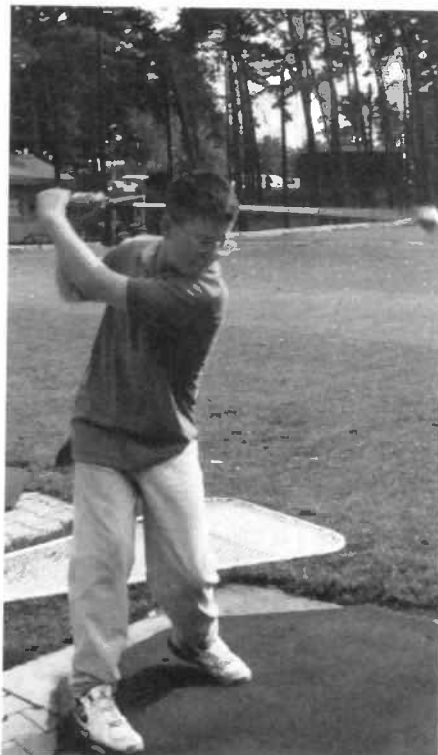
GOLF TEAM TEES OFF

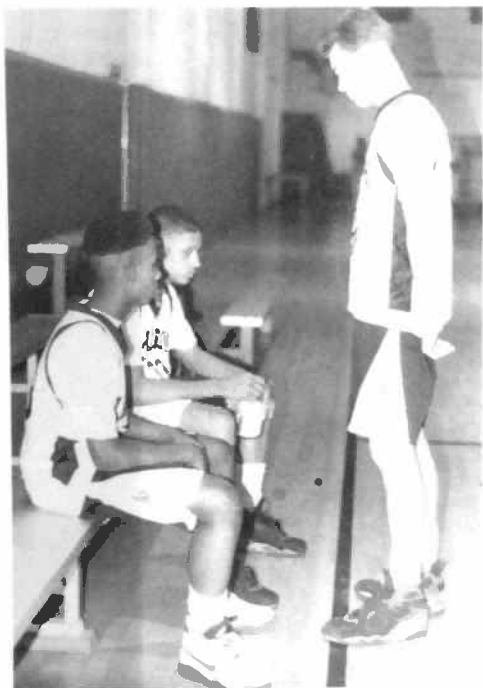

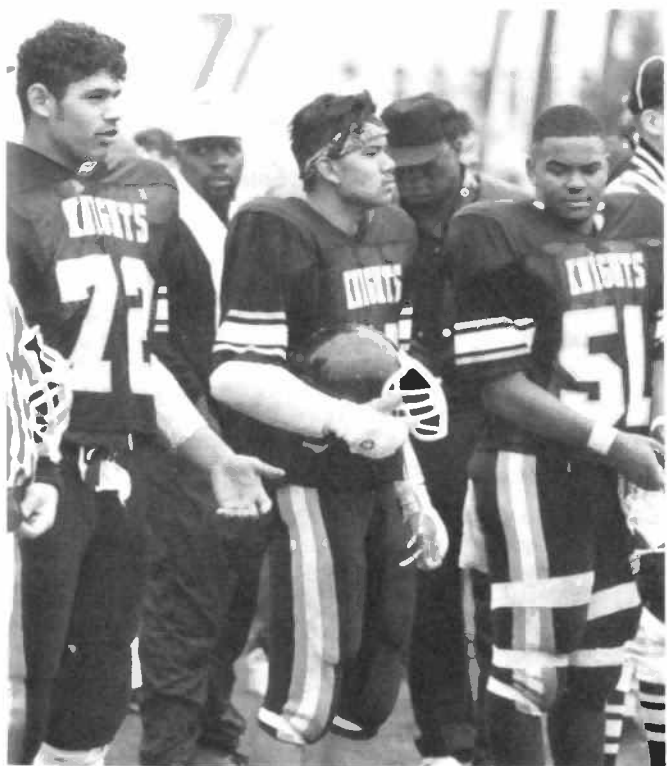
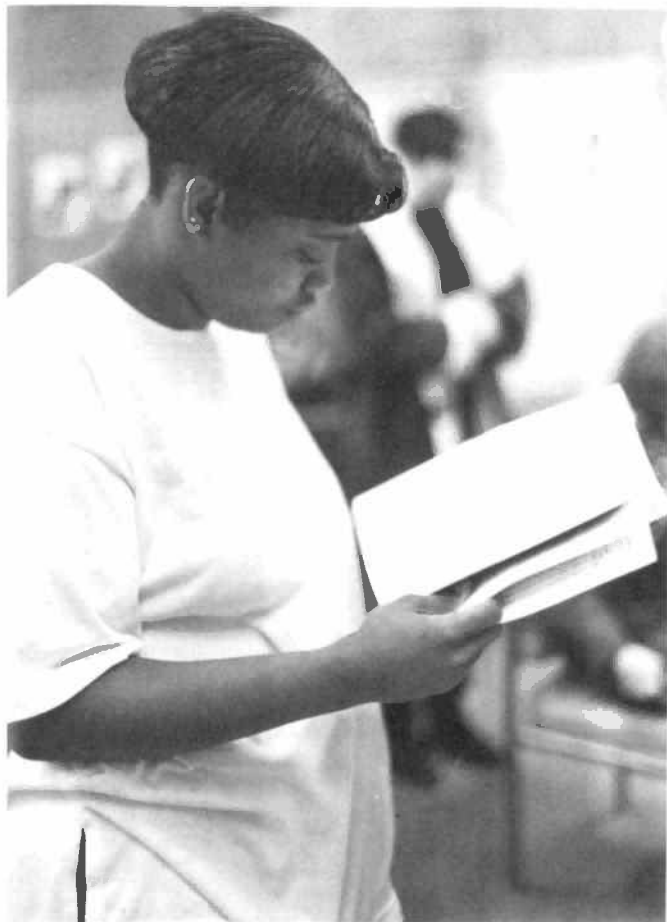
Letter from the Editor

Remembering Karlsruhe High

Karlsruhe High School has had quite a history. Before KAHS opened, high school students were bused to and from Heidelberg H.S. "These buses were Army buses that only went the speed of about 30 miles per hour," recalls Karlsruhe's science and health teacher and Athletic Director, Mr. Bailey. Through the teen club, teens petitioned to have a high school at Karlsruhe. With victory, the doors of Karlsruhe High School opened the fall of 1958. Clyde Born took the reigns of KHS as the first principal.

Karlsruhe's school colors, mascot, and more had to be decided. This task was accomplished by the first graduating class of 1959, which was composed of twelve seniors.

For the thirty-four years he has been here, Mr. Bailey has seen KHS

change and grow. One of the changes include the track and field at Smiley Barracks. These were strictly built for the high school football and track teams.

Before then, the teams had to go to Gerszewski for football, basketball and track games. Approximately eight years ago, the Annex, tennis courts and soccer field were added under the same contract.

The students of the 90's have taken things for granted. It wasn't until the early 60's that girls were able to participate in any sport. That sport was golf. The 70's allowed girls to play in volleyball, basketball and track. It wasn't until the 80's that girls could play soccer.

Mrs. Bailey has been at KHS for 19 years as the school counselor, and she has also seen changes. Graduating

classes used to have between sixty and eighty-five seniors. We presently have forty-one, which is an improvement from last years twenty-eight graduating seniors.

Ms. Brendsel, the media specialist, has seen transformations at KAHS. "The library was once half of what is now. The elementary library and part of the guidance office was the library office and storage area. The rest of the guidance was a dental office with two dental chairs and sinks."

Although Karlsruhe High School is rapidly becoming a victim of the drawdown in Europe, and those that have called Germany home now have to return to the States, those students and teachers who have been a part of KAHS will keep the memory alive forever in their hearts.
